1 Land Acknowledgement and Introduction

We acknowledge that we are on the Stó:lō traditional territory with our neighbours of Cheam First Nation, Seabird Island and with the independent communities of Sts'ailes and Sq'ewlets First Nation.

Ms. Allyson Friesen introduced herself as the facilitator for the evening and introduced members of District of Kent Council and staff. Participants were encouraged to share their feedback by writing questions on materials provided at their tables, participate in the question and comments session, and completing a survey.

2 Presentation

Ms. Friesen spoke to the presentation attached as Appendix 'A'.

Ms. Friesen conveyed that Council and staff are eager to hear feedback from attendees and requested those with questions or comments please come to the podium.

3 Questions / Comments

Question 1

How do you pronounce it?

Mayor Pranger

Lets'emo:t, it means "one heart, one mind" in Halq'eméylem.

Question 2

If you are a current pass holder at the Community Recreation and Cultural Centre (CRCC), what happens?

Director of Recreation/Culture and Projects

Your current membership will still be valid for the CRCC which is the dry side. You would have the option of buying a membership for the pool when it opens, we are also looking at refunding options to get you into the right product that you want to use once pricing changes on July 30th.

Question 2
(continued)

Okay, that just made me more confused.

There was a slide up there about non-residents. I live in Harrison Hot Springs, and I understand our Council has decided not to forward any money to the facility. My question is though; I still don't understand the cost. You're saying I could buy one of those passes but before I do, I have to pay \$700 a year?

Allyson Friesen

If you want a membership as a non-resident, you are welcome to pay the non-resident price. If you use the facility and register for programs, it might be beneficial to your family to purchase a Kent Resident Program (KRP) card.

Question 2 (continued)	You're saying in order for me to take advantage of that \$274.50, I have to pay \$800 a year.
Director of Recreation/Culture and Projects	The \$800 fee is for the entire household. There is an individual fee of \$350 to access the KRP if you're a household of one.
Question 2 (continued)	So, \$350 plus \$274,50 for me to have a full pass for six months.
Director of Recreation/Culture and Projects	Yes.
Question 3	Thank you for the presentation. I am having great difficulty following all the numbers, I want to ask if there going to be a handout with all of that information so I can digest it? I was furiously trying to take notes and I couldn't catch up. Will there be a handout tonight of the presentation on the screen? Or if not tonight, can it be made available perhaps at the Kent office for those of us who'd like to look at it? From a financial analysis point of view, I really need to have those budget numbers in front of me and if there is a business plan, that would be great too.
The Director of Financial Services	Following the presentation tonight, this information will be going on our website, it will be available to the public then. Staff are more than happy to meet with yourself, or any other member following the meeting to go over the numbers, even at the office tomorrow with a follow up email or phone call.
Question 3 (continued)	No hard copies first?
The Director of Financial Services	Not right now, just the survey in front of you. That is all we have for tonight.
Question 4	Is the resident card a one-time purchase or is it you have to buy it again and again every time your membership is up for renewal.
Director of Recreation/Culture and Projects	If you're a current District of Kent resident, you are automatically issued the card when you come in and purchase your product. For non-residents to be part of the KRP, it is an annual fee.
Question 5	I just want to clarify, that as a Kent resident, you said as a choice you can either have the whole recreation centre pass or can you just get the pool pass and it is valid six months or a year?

Director of Recreation/Culture
and Projects

Good question. We are going to have passes that allow for the current access that you enjoy, being the dry side. We will have specific passes if you only want to be a user of the pool, and we will have a product if you want to use everything. We will have the usual 1-, 3-, 6-, and 12-month options.

Question 6

I may be a bit unusual in that I am a resident of the Village of Harrison, but I pay a lot of taxes in Kent. I don't see anything in there that would give me as a large taxpayer any kind of a break on these passes.

I am particularly alarmed about what looked like about almost a million-dollar annual operating deficit or loss. Will that go straight onto the taxpayer like me who pay taxes on the property in Kent. Is that how that's going to be handled?

The Director of Financial
Services

As noted on one of the slides, recreation services, just like fire, development services, road and snow removal, are all funded partially from taxes. In our case, recreation services anticipated to be funded at almost 60% at deficit. We like to consider it an investment and recreation obviously is an investment in our community. That will be funded by property taxes.

Property taxes are collected from residences, businesses, industrial properties, farmland properties. All the properties in the District will be putting funding towards the new recreation centre and those have been part of the increases in taxes you've seen last year, this year, and a little bit next year too. It has been phased in slowly over time.

Question 7

I am one of the Super Seniors that has been using the weight room, and I am extremely grateful to the recreation centre for allowing us to use their centre. As a Super Senior from Harrison, I am very willing to pay instead of getting the \$0 fee that those from Agassiz are also getting. But looking at your non-resident fee, for a year that would be \$940 a year which is very high. I won't be able to continue coming to the weight room that way.

I am a little confused, you were saying that there would be individual fees for the pool, could there not be one for the weight room? I need the weight room for my rehab and mobility. What happens when this is cut off? I have no idea what will happen to my health in that situation.

Is there any possibility, just to consider that there be a fee for individual areas. For instance, annual fee for the

	weight room instead of doing all the facilities. I will not be using the pool. The weight room has been a medical saviour for me. Otherwise, I would probably be using a walker, and I am not at this particular time.
Director of Recreation/Culture and Projects	The KRP does allow all the other resident benefits, if you are willing to pay the \$350 KRP, then you would get the Super Senior benefit to continue coming to the weightroom. We have not discussed getting rid of the Super Senior pass.
Question 7 (continued)	According to the July 6, 2026 Council meeting, the Super Senior would no longer serve non-residents. According to the July 6 outline that was put on your budget the Super Senior for residents is still \$0, but the Super Senior for non-residents would be the same fee as an older adult.
Manager of Recreation/Culture and Projects	Once you purchase a KRP, you get the same benefits as a resident. You would get the Super Senior discount or for those who want the annual pass sale or access to the economic access program.
Director of Recreation/Culture and Projects	Yes, we have passes that would be just for the weight room or gymnasium and passes that would be just for the pool. Some passes would let you into everything depending on what you want to do, we will have different products to hopefully meet as many needs as we can.
Question 8	Just curious, will there be the opportunity to – I use the weight room almost daily and I might use the pool randomly, but how about the sauna? Would there be a drop-in rate for just the sauna? I am really excited for that.
Director of Recreation/Culture and Projects	The admission price to enter the wet side, regardless of what you're using it for, would be the admission to the pool. We do have single admission drop-in rates and we have 10 admission passes if that's what you want to do. For your second admission, we have built in some flexibility for a discounted price on a second usage of the rec centre, the second same visit.
Question 8 (continued)	What does a one-year pass look like? Most of us do a one-year, not six-month. What does that look like? Is it literally double the six-month rate? In the past a one-year was cheaper than a six-month and a lot cheaper than a 3-month. Just curious what a one-year pass would look

	like of it there's a chart available what kind of pricing so I can look and see what the discounted price might be before July 30th.
Director of Recreation/Culture and Projects	We do plan on making those available as soon as possible. We wanted to get through these meetings, collect feedback prior to laying everything out there.
Question 8 (continued)	Okay, that's fair. With the pricing, will there be one-time a week or three-times a week daily special where there's like a toonie special or something? Hope has a dead once or twice a week and they have a senior's discount. It's a good deal, for \$2 you enter the entire facility.
Director of Recreation/Culture and Projects	We are looking at a bunch of different special promotions and events and different things. I can't guarantee they're going to be a toonie, but staff are looking to program a bunch of different types of activities much like we do now. I know we have different \$2 drop-in times and different activities through-out the day and they will definitely be continuing.
Question 9	Just a quick question, beyond the 30th of July, is there going to be like a one week, two-week period which you can buy a pass, or do you have to do it the 30th of July?
Director of Recreation/Culture and Projects	July 30th to August 4th is our annual pass sale, which is a long-standing tradition that we have, and we are happy to continue that sale.
CAO	I just wanted to share this with the public, with the residents of the District of Kent and also the non-residents from outside the municipality. The two-tiered system with a non-resident fee has come to this because our communication has ended with Harrison Hot Springs. We have had five meeting with the Harrison Hot Springs Council and at the end of the day they said no, they do not want to participate in having an Alternative Approval Process (AAP) or a public referendum on the issue of funding the pool, which we feel is transparent and everybody should be aware of it. We have also had a meeting with Electoral Area 'D' Director to ascertain if he would like to contribute to the pool (Popkum/Rosedale). Since there were no commitments from the other parties, we have had no choice but to look at, with our Council, to examine a non-residential fee. I don't think it is fair to borne the cost of taxation on the residents of the District of Kent when you have other users from outside the municipality using the facility.

We are hoping that if it is a concern, that you would talk to your political leaders about your concerns. This is a public meeting, we have always said we would have public meetings to be transparent. We were hoping this public meeting would be for an AAP or referendum meeting but that did not materialize. We want to share that with you.

Question 10

I was just wondering where the \$800 for a family of four came from, are we comparing that's roughly what a household in Kent would have their taxes increased for the new pool? Is that how you arrived at that number?

Director of Recreation/Culture and Projects

That number came across from looking at other municipalities. We compared others that have resident and non-resident prices and factored in kind of our current taxation levy per household to kind of come up with a round number. It is not an exact number based on any one criteria, it is an average of municipalities that are in the same boat as we are and trying to utilize an average of that. We are actually under the average, but we want to make sure that we're pricing for our region.

Question 11

Will the passes be available for purchase online or do we have to come in person?

Manager of Recreation/Culture and Projects

During the pass sale, we do not have the ability to apply the discount online, so those will have to be purchased in-person. During non-pass sale times, they can be purchased online.

Question 11
(continued)

When purchasing online, what would you have to do to prove your residence?

Manager of Recreation/Culture and Projects

You can only purchase a membership online if you have the KRP already applied to your account, so you won't be able to purchase a membership until your account is set up. Staff can flag resident and non-resident accounts.

Question 12

I have to get a knee replacement, I have used the facility for many years and I am looking forward to being able to use the pool, but I am probably not going to be able to use it. I want to get in on the pass, but I don't want to pay for time that I am not going to be using it because of my rehabilitation. How would that work?

Manager of Recreation/Culture and Projects

You can apply for a, what we call, a medical pause of your membership. We just request proof of any medical procedures and we will pause the membership to the date you choose to re-activate it.

I was reminded as well that we do have lifts for the new

facility as well as ramps to make them accessible.

Question 13

The Village of Harrison is just in the process of hiring a consultant to conduct a feasibility study on some use of the hot springs source. The budget of \$250,000 just for the study, as I sit here tonight looking at this presentation, I must ask was there a feasibility study done on this project before it started? If so, is that available for public scrutiny? I would very much like to see that.

CAO

Yes, there was a study undertaken many years ago and the residents chose the pool as a top priority. That was done many years ago, prior to me even arriving in 2007. In fact, one of the first things that was asked of me to undertake was to build a new pool.

The study confirmed that is what the people in the community wanted. I am sure we could find that study.

Question 14

If the community decided to move forward with building a pool, I understand, but shouldn't they be absorbing the cost?

CAO

I think as you know in today's times, there's only one taxpayer, that's us, everybody in this room. We pay federal, provincial, and local government tax. When you build amenities or facilities in today's times, it's about sharing those facilities and sharing the services. We share services with Harrison Hot Springs on a regular basis. We fund the Search and Rescue program, we share that with Harrison. We share the library along with Emergency planning and mutual aid Fire Services etc.

Typically, governments like to work together and jointly with our First Nation communities and our adjacent municipalities and Regional Districts. We are undertaking this project and negotiating with parties like Electoral Area 'D' and the Village of Harrison Hot Springs and our First Nation communities. The bottom line is that at the end of the day, we couldn't come into terms with some of the other parties. We are now left with how we are going to fund the project. We don't want to put the complete responsibility on our taxpayers because as illustrated in the slides, you saw that 53% of Harrison's population use the facility. But then their political leaders are saying they are not ready to pay for their usage.

Question 14
(continued)

I understand that. I live in Electoral Area 'C', I would have to talk to our Director but I don't really have anyone to converse with or let my feelings be known.

Allyson Friesen

We are looking for all of that feedback. There's a variety of ways to be able to get your feedback heard. As I mentioned the survey, the boards in the back and again, for those who have access to their elected officials. We encourage you to have those conversations.

One other thing to add is the District of Kent to be able to get the federal and provincial funding it was based on partnerships with the regional communities. The project has moved forward under that shared understanding that this would be a shared regional project and only recently has that understanding changed.

Question 15

Rather than put the extra cost on the municipality or stuff like this, could you not just add it on to the users until it's paid. I do not understand your system here.

Allyson Friesen

That is essentially what's happening. There's an amount that the District of Kent has been prepared to pay and again, the community has done extensive fundraising to be able to support that even further. Like the Coquihalla Highway, there was a toll fee. A fee to be able to use that highway until it was paid. What's being proposed here is a resident and non-resident fee for those folks who haven't already paid into it. There's an additional fee to use those facilities.

Question 15
(continued)

You really need to see all these figures on a piece of paper to really absorb everything. I mean I see all the numbers here, but I don't quite understand everything. I will read it in the morning when the brain functions best.

Question 16

Was fundraising done in other communities other than Kent? Was it only Kent doing the fundraising?

CAO

We did have some fundraising through the Committee; we did have residents that sat on that committee and also participated in the fundraising. So, yes, Harrison did some of the fundraising and I think to date we have achieved around \$650,000. Council had set a target for the Committee to reach of \$1 million.

You need to understand; we have a letter of support here from the Village of Harrison Hot Springs that dates back to 2020 where they supported the pool. There was a lot of enthusiasm right from the get-go. We have been working with Harrison Hot Springs like we always do and with the other communities to try and acquire as much money as we can through fundraising or through donations or through private sector contributions. We have been very successful reaching \$650,000. We are hoping to reach the target of \$1 million by the end of this year.

Question 17	If residents here decided to go to the Council of Harrison Hot Springs and we are able to convince Council to make that decision to support the pool and they agree to the contribution, would that then make a difference in them being able to access the pool at the same rates as District of Kent residents?
CAO	Absolutely. There's a good example right now on market that was just achieved by the City of Vernon where initially some of the outlying areas said they were not going to contribute and now they've reached an agreement to pay their fair share.
Question 18	Could you not essentially set that pricing to whatever you want and the \$800 just makes a really nice and easy comparison to the \$170 per residence that it would be calculated on had Harrison contributed to the project in the first place? The annual fee, you need to have a number to start making a program because you're out of time and you need to make a program and you need to have pricing in place for when your passes go on sale in three or four weeks. That number pulled from an average of number of figures, could you not set that to whatever is a functional price for your organization?
Director of Financial Services	If we take a step back and look at the \$170 estimated value that's based on all the residents in Harrison paying residents, businesses, just like in Kent since it's all properties in Kent. That is why the rate is only \$170 per house, because it is shared by every property in Harrison. By not having that shared over multiple people, the fee is \$800.
Question 18 (continued)	I ask because I remember paying for a library card, some of us had to pay \$20 for a library card because our municipalities didn't participate in the program and that felt bad.
Question 18 (answered by a member of the public)	What happened was that they agreed that the Harrison residents who weren't at that time contributing to the library should be able to use the library. The Village said if any resident wants to go and pay their \$20 for the use of the library, bring your receipt to the Village Office and we will refund you that. So, the Village was paying that \$20 back.
Allyson Friesen	Does anyone else have any further questions?

Question 19

Will the one-year pass for the weightroom or for the pool be a different price for the first year because it doesn't open until July 30th? Like the pool, is it going to be prorated? Will prices change the second year? How will that work?

Director of Recreation/Culture
and Projects

The passes for the pool, it will not change come January 1st.

Question 20

I want to make the suggestion, the presentation, I presume, is going to be made tomorrow night at the Harrison Lake Hotel, which is the one opposite the Post Office. When that presentation is made, could I strongly suggest that you make some hard copies for that so people can actually read the numbers? I found it very difficult to try and make the notes of what you had presented, and it would be in the best interest of public disclosure and communication if you were to make some hard copies of the presentation for the residents of Harrison to pick up tomorrow night.

Question 21

We have talked about a discount, does this discount also include non-residents or is it just for residents as of July 30th?

Director of Recreation/Culture
and Projects

It is just for residents unless you purchase a KRP.

Question 22

There's a lot of Super Seniors that come from Harrison and I showed them the numbers and they asked me to come tonight so I said I would and tomorrow I'm going to be inundated with questions. So, get hard copies that you can show them that if they are not a resident of Kent, their tax dollars don't go towards this pool.

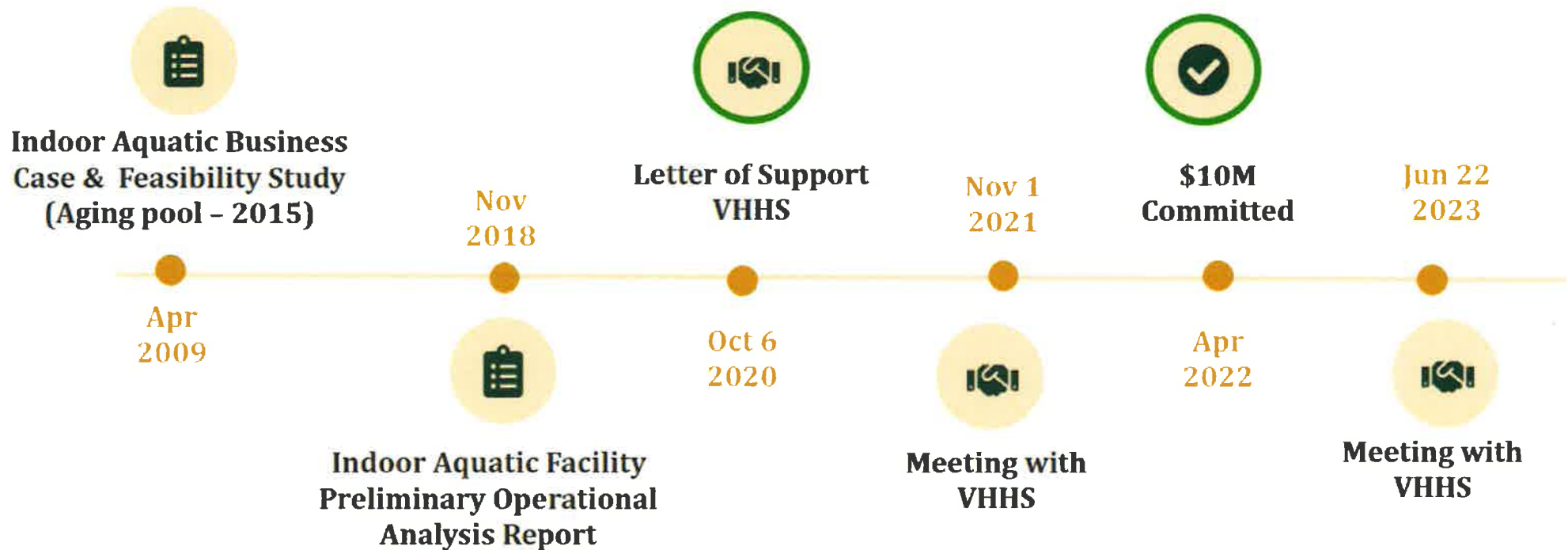

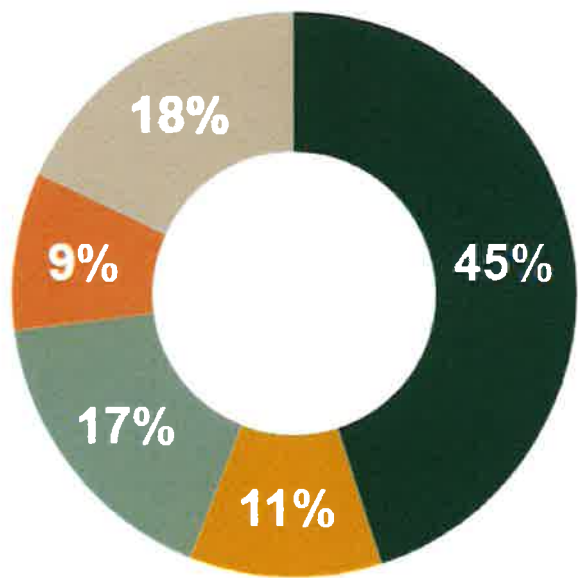

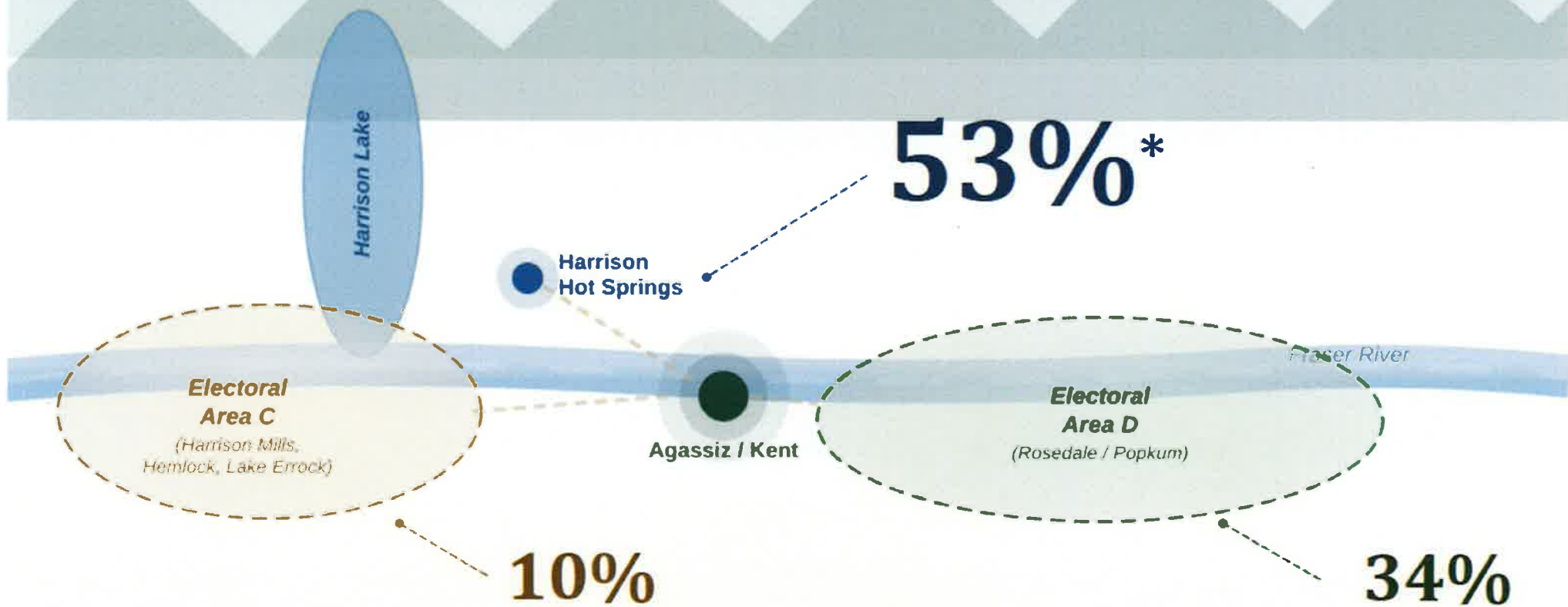

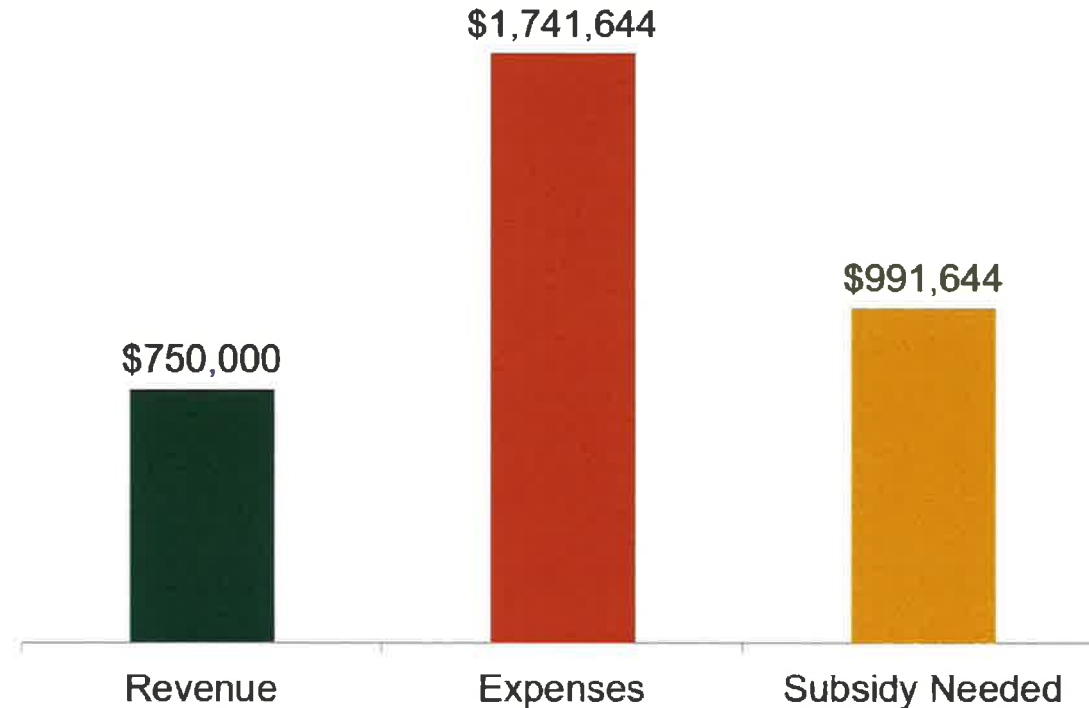
